*this volume reports on the state of crisis in africa in the early twenty first century africa on the eve of the independence revolution was the continent of hope and high expectations by the third decade of independence optimism had been replaced by dismally african states had been beset by ethno political squabbles military rule civil wars islamic and insurgent movements extreme poverty and disease with the ascent of redemocratization in the 1990s and of new pan africanism derived from the formation of the african union africa appeared set to claim its vaunted destiny this book asks with hindsight to the first decade of*

the twenty first century how real was the renaissance in african life if the dismal african condition is a phase in the historical development of africa this volume does not see any golden age in the past to which africa aspires to return there is clearly a continuation and persistence of crisis with an absence of good governance personalisation of state power widespread disease and policy failure in education economy and infrastructural development although endowed with abundant human and natural resources africa remains the least developed and most indebted continent whither then the african renaissance the methodologies that underpin the contributions in this book are as diverse as the specialisations of the contributors the collection questions ideologically protected assumptions and presumptions presenting africa as it is because it is only by knowing where africa truly stands that a proper direction can be charted for it

this book draws attention to emerging issues around the rights of minorities marginalized groups and persons in africa it explores the gaps between human rights provisions and conditions showing that although international human rights principles have been embraced in the continent various minority groups and marginalized persons are denied such rights through criminalization and persecution african countries have a good record of signing and ratifying international and regional rights instruments but the political will and capacity for enforcing these with respect to minorities remain weak international contributors to the book provide new perspectives on the rights of marginalized and minority groups in different parts of africa and the extent to which they are deprived or denied entitlement to the universality and equality articulated in law the authors show that human rights while having come of age as a moral ideal has not been fully entrenched in practice towards groups such as children indigenous populations the mentally ill persons with disabilities and persons with albinism this volume is geared toward scholars students human rights groups policy makers social workers international organizations and policy makers in the fields of criminology security studies development studies political science sociology children studies social psychology international relations postcolonial studies and african studies

africa s modern history is replete with different forms of encounters and conflicts from the fifteenth century when millions of africans were forcefully taken away as slaves during the infamous atlantic slave trade to the colonial conquests of the nineteenth century where european countries conquered and subsequently balkanized africa and shared the continent to european powers and to the postcolonial era where many african leaders have maintained several instruments of exploitation the continent has seen different forms of encounters exploitations and oppressions these encounters and exploitations have equally been met with resistance in different forms and at different times the mode of africa s encounters with the rest of the world have in several ways shaped and continue to shape the continent s social political and economic development trajectories essays in this volume have addressed different aspects of these phases of encounters and resistance by africa and the african diaspora while the volume document different phases of oppression and conflict it also contains some accounts of africa s resistance to external and internal oppressions and exploitations from the physical guerilla resistance of the mau mau group against british colonial exploitation in kenya and its aftermath to efforts of the kayble group to preserve their language and culture in modern algeria and from the innovative ways in which the tuareg are using guitar and music as forms of expression and resistance to the modern ways in which contemporary african immigrants in north america are coping with oppressive structures and racism the chapters in this volume have examined different phases of oppressions and suppressions of africa and its people as well as acts of resistance put up by africans

the spectres of marx and lenin have long loomed prominently in africa and asia and they still do so in the 21st century many of the founding fathers of postcolonial republics believed socialism could transform their societies yet what socialism meant in theory and in practice has always been highly heterogeneous and differed markedly from the european experience african and asian movements did not simply mimic the ideas and institutions of soviet or european marxists but endeavoured to define their own experimenting with a variety of interpretations and in the process adapting doctrines and templates to their unique contexts this volume brings together anthropologists historians and political scientists from around the world to reflect on three great challenges which various types of socialists in africa and asia have had to simultaneously contend with in their articulations of liberation how to build up empirical and juridical statehood how to forge a nation after colonial divide and rule and how to position themselves in an international order not of their making in a post colonial world this helps centre a key question running through the different chapters what can african and asian imaginaries institutions and practices tell us about socialism as a global phenomenon the chapters in this book were originally published as a special issue of third world quarterly

niumi a small little known territory located on the bank of the gambia river in west africa is seemingly far from the reaches of world historical events and yet the outside world has long had a significant and increasingly profound impact on niumi this

fascinating work shows how global events have affected people's lives over the past eight centuries in this small region in Africa's smallest country drawing on written and oral testimony and writing in a clear and personal style Donald R Wright connects globalization with real people in a real place this new edition updates discussions of global history and African history based on current studies and new developments that have been factored into the interpretive framework reflecting on recent visits to Niumi Wright extends the story into 2009 to consider the impact of global recession and domestic political repression under a regime in power for the past fifteen years punctuating the narrative are photographs maps and perspectives boxes on selected topics such as the sale of slaves five centuries ago colonial sexism the fate of press freedom and how popular culture affects growing up in a traditional society throughout the author deals with African history seriously global trends critically and human lives sensitively

this year's African economic outlook reviews recent economic social and political developments and the short term likely evolution of Africa the focus is on Africa's emerging economic partnerships

this book provides a review of recent development in Africa it reviews NEPAD and the AU and suggests what must be done for African countries to reverse their growth and security trajectories by asking if any African country will establish the prerequisites for sustained high level growth

from the exodus of early modern humans to the growth of African diasporas Africa has had a long and complex relationship with the outside world more than a passive vessel manipulated by external empires the African experience has been a complex mix of internal geographic environmental sociopolitical and economic factors and regular interaction with outsiders Peter Mitchell attempts to outline these factors over the long period of modern human history to find their commonalities and development over time he examines African interconnections through Egypt and Nubia with the Near East through multiple Indian Ocean trading systems through the trans-Saharan trade and through more recent incursion of Europeans the African diaspora is also explored for continuities and resistance to foreign domination commonalities abound in the African experience as do complexities of each individual period and interrelationship Mitchell's sweeping analysis of African connections place the continent in context of global prehistory and history the book should be of interest not only to Africanists but to many other archaeologists historians geographers linguists social scientists and their students
